# Finding and Navigating Old Irish Maps

- Why do this?
  - Help locate relatives and homeland.
  - Helpful when census records/ Other records don't provide detail
  - Can relate to current locations if you travel to Ireland

# Some terms to know.

- **Counties** – 32 in all. 26 in the Republic of Ireland and 6 in Northern Ireland
  - Alteration of borders in 1898 and name changes in 1922
- **Baronies**- 327. Larger than County. Vital location marker for civil parishes with the same name.
- **Civil Parishes**- 2,509. administrative units of territory, formalized by Cromwell's Plantation of Ireland.
  - May cross towns and counties
  - Basis for the Griffiths Valuation and land tax records
  - Separate from ( not always) Church Parish Records
- **Townlands**- 61,118. Smallest subdivision.
  - Traceable address, many with same name.

# Timelines

## During and After Great Famine

- Griffiths Primary Valuation Maps 1847-1864
  - Matched by number and letter
  - Can be searched online- AskAboutIreland- by surname and placename. Changes- Counties resurveyed- after famine years
- 25-inch Series Ordnance Survey Maps-1893-1913
  - Used to tie to names in 1901 & 1911 Ireland Census
  - Street name and townland locations

- Before the Great Famine
  - The Down Survey of Ireland -1656-1658
    - Measure all land to be forfeited by Catholics and redistributed to new landlords'

  - Taylor& Skinners Maps of the Roads of Ireland 1777 & 1782. 288 pages

# Names

- Helpful information
  - In local oral tradition people were known by the given name of a parent or grandparent. John McDermott(Bryan) ; John Mc Dermott(James).
  - Locally known as John Bryan and John James.
  - Important in records search.
- Naming Patterns:
  - 1<sup>st</sup>.born son named for Fathers Father
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> born son named for Mothers Father
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> Born son named for Father
  - 4<sup>th</sup> born son named for Fathers Eldest Brother.
  - 1st born daughter named for Mothers Mother
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> born daughter named for Fathers Mother
  - 3rd born daughter named for Mother
  - 4<sup>th</sup> born daughter Named for Mothers Eldest Sister

- Karen Beagle- Keneally/Kenneally (Cork & Limerick); Hallanan (Askilane, Mayo); O'Malley (Westport, Mayo, Leitrim); Looney (Cork); Lynch (Kerry); Donovan (Cork/Westmeath); Neil/Neill; Lyons/Lyon (NI) Thompson/Thomson (Ulster); Murry(Ulster); Curry/Currie (Ulster); Reed/Reid (NI); Caldwell (Ulster)

- Joanne Close – Campbell; Walsh (Waterford); Nugent (Waterford); Ahern/Ahearn/O’Hearn (Cork) Madden (Cork); Dalton
- Nora Hollis– Flavin (Cork/Limerick); Fitzgerald(Same); Morrissey (Same ,maybe Waterford)
- Peter Stauder– Curley ( Galway); Lyna/Lynagh (?); Faherty (Galway), McDonough (Galway); Duffy/Duffey (Roscommon)
